We were able to kick-off our new giving community called The Forest, welcoming new members in our quest to

fight climate change and build community. All this and more!

In 2021, we are looking forward to starting our 5th crop of seedlings at the nursery, as well as constructing a much-needed permanent storage and workspace structure. We have hope that we will again be able to hold educational workshops with local and regional community members. We will continue to expand our out-planting site, including the building of fencing around test plots to protect the research being done there. Our youth group is bursting at the seams. We are already in the process of securing more space for them to meet and capacity to serve more members. These are just a few of the things we look forward to in 2021 and look forward to sharing them all with you.

We can't say thank you enough for the incredible ICPSD community. We are humbled and honored in the relentless commitment to empowering African communities to be at the center of their own development. Thank you for being part of ICPSD.

About ICPSD

We believe communities thrive in healthy ecosystems.

Togo is one of the top five countries in the world for fastest rate of deforestation. As a result, less than five percent of the land in Togo remains forested. The stable funds provided by The Forest members allow ICPSD to maintain and grow the Ecosystem Restoration Program (ERP). ERP directly supports the reclamation, restoration and preservation of ecosystems in Togo through the utilization of native species and community development.

At the heart of ERP is a native plant nursery. The nursery is the primary platform from which ERP supports the reclamation and revitalization of native plant species within the framework of sustainable systems. It is a center for learning and research, a place where local and regional members of the Togolese community attend hands on workshops to learn about and explore sustainable practices for reforestation and afforestation efforts. It is also central to fostering citizen science and community-based understanding of climate change mitigation and adaptation measures. It provides information and vital mitigation measures that are location specific and community managed. The nursery out planting site is a multi-fold operation. Not only is it a place to increase forested land in Togo, but it is also the primary site for long-term native tree research and agroforestry experimentation. It is an important outdoor environment for citizen science in local and regional communities. All information gathered at the nursery and out planting site is made available for easy replication and adaptability in other regions and communities.

This year we were able to get the nursery hooked up to city water (as backup to the well during drought season) as well as able to subsidize the cost of laying pipes to 22 homes around the nursery. The biggest challenges ERP faced in 2020 were obtaining viable native plant seeds, a high percentage of non-viable seedlings for planting, limited personnel resources for starting seeds due to national COVID restrictions, low resources for education about reforestation (the inability to hold workshops due to COVID), and building understanding and valuation of data collection.

Outplanting and Agroforestry







Agroforestry is a strong component of the Ecosystem Restoration Program (ERP). Based on our own field observations and supported by multiples studies (FAO 2018, FCPF 2015, Kokou et al. 2008), forest degradation in Togo is caused by agricultural practices and unsustainable land use. Additionally, like other Sub-Saharan African countries, most Togolese households rely on wood fuel as a source of energy for cooking. In Togo, fuelwood and charcoal account for more than 80% of the national household energy consumption. Land-use conversion and non-native timber plantations have serious impacts on the health of the soil as well as ecosystem processes.

ERP employs agroforestry, a land management approach that provides opportunities to integrate productivity and profitability with environmental stewardship, which results in healthy agriculture and forest systems.

- Effective land use by mixing reforestation and agricultural production, which will limit the total land size for agriculture.
- Production and plantation of nitrogen species for agroforestry to support sustainable crop
 production and agroforestry enterprises. Trees help control runoff and soil erosion, thereby
 reducing losses of water, soil material, organic matter and nutrients at levels satisfactory for soil
 fertility.
- Maximization of financial gain for farmers who will benefits from the sale of forest products.
 Agroforestry can provide a more diverse farm economy and stimulate the whole rural economy, leading to more stable farms and communities.

"The ICPSD nursery has produced many tree species since 2016. They have provided local farmers a system of agroforestry with many benefits such as diversification of local economies, protection for valuable crops, wildlife and top soil, reduction of chemical fertilizers, and protection as windbreaks. Additionally, our seedlings are all native, so they are well adapted to their outplanting site conditions."



The Youth Community Development Program (YCDP) is designed to facilitate leadership development that supports the personal and professional growth of participants. It supports local middle and high school aged students as they explore ways to build local capacity, self-reliance, and knowledge for the betterment and sustainability of their community. As a group, students elect peer leadership as well as the leadership initiatives they would like to learn about and share with the community. In 2019 YCDP saw an increase in participation from 46 participants to 50, despite the graduation of 25 seniors. There was also an increase in age diversity of the group, with participants spanning five grade levels, up from the previous two.

This year looked a little different with COVID. It was more difficult to gather and participate in the regular programming requested by the YCDP participants. But with diligence in following COVID protocols and by partnering with Style Her Empowered, the students were able to stay on top of their studies during a summer schooling session as well as eventually gather again to participate in the joy of dancing, community and other such activities at the heart of YCDP.

We are currently experiencing the happy challenge of not enough space to accommodate the growing number of students participating in YCDP and are pursuing alternative options to remedy this. We were also sad to say goodbye to our English instructor Mawuli K. Dagnon at the end of the year, but welcome Kanyi Ayi, the new instructor for 2021.

The students in YCDP who participated in the national exams showed excellent results overall!

- Le Bac (13th grade final year of high school in Togo): 9 candidates sat for the test, 6 passed and have the option to continue on to University if they are able.
- Le Probatoire (12th grade): 19 candidates sat for the test, 17 passed.
- Le BEPC (10th grade): 4 candidates at for the test, all 4 passed.

We are very proud of the hard work of all of our students and honored to support them!

With COVID, some of our resource allocations looked a little different this year. But we were able to do so much with the donations we received:

- Purchase face masks for all YCDP students and ICPSD staff from our partner organization Style Her Empowered.
- Under the guidance of our Youth Program Coordinator Francoise, we were able to provide food staples for 24 students and their families twice during the COVID shutdown.
- We were able to keep supplementary instruction active during the shutdown through the efforts of our English instructor. He prepared lessons that were digitally sent out to the youth group. As shutdown restrictions were slowly lifted, he met one-on-one following safety protocols to tutor students who were preparing to take the national exams.
- We partnered with Style Her Empowered to build permanent hand washing stations at the local high school for students who returned to classes in order to prepare for the national exams.
- We provide school supplies to all YCDP students for the 2020-21 school year.

Agroforestry

Communities in Togo rely heavily on small family farming. This also makes them more susceptible to the ramifications of climate change. The introduction of trees increases forest cover and improves soil quality through nutrient restoration, water retention, and carbon retention. It can also provide a replenishing approach to wood fuels, a large cause for deforestation in Togo.

Community Driven Development

Community participation and leadership are the cornerstone of all ICPSD operations, including ERP. Overseen by a local forest and restoration specialist, the native plant nursery provides a place accessible to all community members in which to learn, research and trouble shoot agroforestry approaches in their unique context. Workshops put on by a local women's cooperative – Lolonu – help educate local and regional leaders and community members in native plant restoration and agroforestry efforts. By partnering with communities, local organizations and local units of government, local community members have better access to resources, support and participation that enhance local capacity while also establishing precedent for sustainable growth into the future.


